Offering of Devon Symbols (may be processed or already on a table)

Sea-water from a Devon beach - symbol of rising sea temperatures, polluted, suffering and dying ocean worlds.

Stunted and unripened local fruits/vegetables – symbols of a lack of sunshine, failed crops, human hunger and famine.

Stone from a collapsed Devonshire cliff or river bank – symbol of dangerous water levels, eroded land, flooded fields, destructive weather.

Three symbols of climate change from three areas of our County. There could be a hundred more symbols of ecological imbalance, human struggle and suffering from many other places.

Lord, we lay in your hands these symbols of your groaning creation. Forgive us our part in the destruction of your carefully balanced world, our home and community. Help us heal and reconcile your earth.

Eucharistic Prayer [6]
